chair itself took up the majority of the space in the cubicle when the patient was reclined. If he turned to face his cubicle desk to choose an instrument from our new sterilization cassettes, the chair would rotate on him. Therefore, to stabilize the chair he would hold it between his knees while pressing the rheostat. The overhead light attached to the chair meanwhile would rotate in the opposite direction to the chair, requiring him to take frequent breaks to adjust its position.

Because of the generosity of our friends and alumni, Richard is now the proud owner of an ADEC 500 dental chair. Now he never misses an opportunity to sing the praises of all

younger pediatric patients open their eyes wide in disbelief when he reclines the chair "with no hands or feet" (presets)! While Richard's young patients think the reclining chair is magic, we know this enchantment was made possible through your gifts of support and care. Thirteen new dental chairs and lights sparkle in the student dental clinic and they are just one of the memorable memories you gave us on this journey last year.
